In May 2013 your Parish Council will be elected, it may be 6 months away but now is the time to give thought as to whether you may wish to stand for Parish Councillor. Here is some guidelines to help you decide.

Who can become a Councillor?

Anyone can stand as a candidate provided they meet the qualification requirements (see page 7) or you can find out more by contacting the Electoral Services department at your Cornwall Council.

What is a Parish Council?

A Parish Council is the tier of local authority closest to its community as it elects representatives from within that community. Parish and Town Councils are democracy on your doorstep.

How much will it cost?

Parish Councils are entitled to levy a tax from their area.

This is known as the precept and covers the running costs for the Council such as: election costs, local services, the Clerk and their expenses.

The cost will vary from Council to Council but Parish Councils are very cost effective, not least because most Parish Councillors do not claim expenses allowances.

Many will also commission local trades people which supports the local economy.

How will the Council be accountable?

The decisions of the Parish Council are made by those Councillors who have been elected - or if not enough candidates stand - co-opted to the Council.

Council meetings are open to the public and Parish Councils must hold one meeting per year which is a meeting for the whole parish known as the Annual Parish Meeting

Who will run the Council?

Parish council elections are held every 4 years.

Councillors, (who cannot be deselected during those four years), are the decision making body for the council.

If there are insufficient nominations - a Council may have no choice but to co-opt non elected members.

Does the Council employ any staff?

A clerk (the proper officer) is appointed to advise councillors, answer enquiries and manage the administration of the council.

Do I qualify to stand for election?

You should be:

Aged over 18

A British, Commonwealth Citizen or Euronational Citizen (who is a registered elector)

Resident for 12 months prior to the day of election - either in the parish or within 3 miles of the boundary

Occupied land or premises for 12 months as owner or tenant - either in the parish or within 3 miles of the boundary

Had a principal place of work - either in the parish or within 3 miles of the boundary

Am I excluded from standing?

You cannot become a Councillor if:

You hold a paid office with the Council

If you are subject to a bankruptcy restrictions order or an interim order creates disqualification which dates from the judgement or execution and generally ends one year after the relevant order is made

If you have within five years before the election or since election been convicted in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man





of any offence and been sentenced to not less than three months imprisonment (whether suspended or not) without the option of a fine Imprisonment probably includes any type of custodial sentence. This disqualification begins when the ordinary period for making an appeal is finally dismissed or abandoned or fails for want of prosecution



A Taxing Time - History Snippet by Jenny

Once upon a time Father Christmas knew the routine! Park on roof. Go down chimney. Fill stockings. Go back up chimney. Simple! Nowadays the old order is changing. Chimneys are becoming a thing of the past. Now you have to leave keys and signs saying SANTA STOP HERE because modern homes don't have a hearth.

So I've been looking back to a time when a chimney was an essential feature of every up-grade in the parish. Charles 11 has been restored to the throne. Its 1662. Charles is short of cash and taxes chimneys!

The Hearth Tax operated for 25 years. You could get fined for false returns and the parish constable could accompany the receivers to search and examine. Many landlords blocked the chimney to avoid paying. Domestic bread ovens had to pay, but not forges, kilns and blowing houses. The poor were exempt. They could get a note from the vicar, countersigned by Justices, if their tenement was worth less than 20/-. So the Hearth Tax records became a rich list for the Parish!



Walter Langdon of Keverall heads up our list with an original tally of 15 hearths. This was later reduced to 13 as there had been a miscalculation! Walter Langdon was also the local commissioner for taxes! Bucklawren had a total of 13. John Hoskyn 5, Denzell Hoore only 4 (because one fell down) and William Wilshman said he had 3 but he actually had 4!

There were two houses at Bodigga –Lower Bodigga and Over Bodigga. It seems that the old place (probably on the site of Windsworth) was being replaced. William Burte sen. had 4 hearths at the old place and young William had 2. Up at Over Bodigga, Daniel has declared 3 in 1662 and then Nicholas Burte's 2 are added, showing that the house is under construction. A Henry Burte also owned 'Tregoyde' – one house with one chimney – but John Geech lived in it.

A Taxing Time - History Snippet by Jenny

Down in Millendreath valley Robert Broad had 3 hearths at Prince's Mill in Churchbridge and Mayor Henry Chubb declared 5 at Poliscourt but he was one short! Two further names of the great and good are recorded but not their houses. Thomas Collinge had 3 chimneys and Richard Langstone said he had 6 but was found to have missed 2! In 1669 Walter Hoskyns becomes eligible for tax at Lanturry (2) and

Walter Cunning (1) at Hayes. So the parish had 15 houses paying for Charles 11's flambuoyant lifestyle. The tax was resented and maybe we can excuse those who fiddled their returns. The rest of us dwelt in unheated hovels with no chimney. No point erecting the SANTA STOP HERE sign though. He won't be invented for another 200 years.

For the cheesecake

*125q/4½oz bourbon biscuits *65q/21/2oz butter, melted *100g/3½oz good-quality dark chocolate, minimum *70 per cent cocoa solids *200g/7oz full-fat cream cheese

*400g/14oz ricotta *75g/21/2oz golden caster sugar

*3 eggs

*40g/1½oz cocoa powder *125g/41/2oz good-quality Christmas pudding, cooked, crumbled into pieces (optional)

For the sauce

*125g/41/2oz good-quality dark chocolate, minimum *70 per cent cocoa solids *125ml/41/2fl oz double cream

*15g/1/2oz butter

To serve

Good-quality chocolate. grated cocoa powder, for dusting, clotted cream, to serve

Cheesecake recipe

Cont:

Preparation method

- 1.Preheat the oven to 180C/ 350F/Gas 4.
- 2.For the cheesecake, crush the bourbon biscuits into crumbs and place into a bowl. Pour over the melted butter. Press into a 20cm/8in spring-form cake tin to form the base.
- 3.Place the chocolate in a bowl over barely simmering water and melt, making sure the water doesn't touch the bottom of the bowl.
- 4.Place the cream cheese, ricotta and sugar in a food processor and blend until smooth.
- 5.Next add the eggs, then the cocoa powder and the melted chocolate. Stir in the Christmas pudding, if using.
- 6. Spoon the mixture onto the base. Place the cake in the oven and cook for approximately 45 minutes, or until cake is springy to the touch. Allow to cool in the tin.
- 7. When cool, turn out of the tin and top with chopped or grated chocolate and a dusting of cocoa.
- 8.For the sauce, place the chocolate and cream in a clean bowl over a pan of simmering water and melt, making sure the water doesn't touch the bottom of the bowl. When melted, whisk in the butter. The sauce must be prepared just before the cake is served, because it can't be reheated.
- 9. Serve with a big spoonful of sauce and a dollop of clotted cream.

Getting the point of road safety



Primary school children across Cornwall are learning more about road safety from Cornwall Council's road safety unit through the <u>Second Steps</u> roadside training.

Second Steps is a practical child pedestrian training scheme which takes place at real roadside locations where specially trained instructors teach children to discover and develop safe pedestrian strategies through interaction and discussion.

The children, aged five to seven, who take part in the training learn three key skills:

Choosing safe places and routes to cross the road Crossing safely between parked cars Crossing safely at junctions

This year, 17 schools across Cornwall are taking part in the Cornwall Council child pedestrian training scheme.

Tracy Porter, Road Safety Officer, says "With the risk of a child pedestrian being involved in a collision increasing when they start school, it is extremely important that our children are armed with the information they need to cross the road safely."

Cold Calling - Don't buy it!

Stay safe from cold calling rogues and say NO to doorstep traders

Trading Standards Officers in Cornwall are urging people to stay safe in their own homes by saying a firm "NO" to cold calling doorstep traders. Householders are encouraged to download a no cold calling 'super sign' from the <u>Trading Standards Institute website</u>. It tells cold calling doorstep traders* to go away –those who don't are committing a criminal offence and consumers should report them to the police or trading standards.

Officers from Cornwall are backing the national campaign to close the door on rogue traders and help end the heartache and financial loss that can be caused by unscrupulous cold callers, who often target the elderly and vulnerable.

More than 10,000 complaints are made about cold calling doorstep traders every year, but this is likely to only be the tip of the iceberg – we know victims are often embarrassed and frightened as many incidents will go unreported.

During the National Consumer Week in November high risk areas in the county were given leaflets on the subject.

Elizabeth Kirk, Cornwall Council Senior Trading Standards Officer said: "Every day Trading Standards Officers up and down the country are dealing with cold callers targeting vulnerable consumers for expensive, unnecessary and badly done home maintenance work.

Our message is clear: we think that there is only one way consumers can really stay safe from rogues in their own homes, and that is by saying 'no' to cold calling doorstep traders.

"With our Cold Calling – Don't Buy It campaign, we want to raise awareness, particularly with our more vulnerable consumers that they should never buy anything from someone calling at their front door."

Cornwall Council cabinet member for Community Safety, Public Protection and Waste Management Lance Kennedy said: "If you need work on your home or want to buy goods don't do it with a stranger on your door step and never under any circumstances allow them into your home. Please think if you didn't know you wanted it you probably don't need it and if you do then call a local trader or supplier, don't buy off strangers - the cost may be more than you can afford!"

Become wild plant 'pioneers'

"Wild plant charity Plantlife (www.plantlife.org.uk), are hoping to reach out to many wild plant enthusiasts and nature lovers by inviting them to become wild plant 'pioneers' and subscribe to a free quarterly e-learning bulletin to learn more about our native wild plants via the 'Wild About Plants' project website - www.wildaboutplants.org.uk .

The November e-bulletin is out now! The Wild About Plants project aims to help people reconnect with the outdoors and their local green-spaces.

Working with schools, families and communities from all walks of life and with fantastic free downloadable resources, the team hope to engage people with the nature on their doorstep.

In recent years subscribers have been asked to record the plant life in their local area and recount what they used to see/pick and forage for. Wild About Plants is funded by Natural England through Access to Nature, as part of the Big Lottery Fund's Changing Spaces programme. It is a partnership project involving partner organisations throughout the country."

Feeding our Winter visitors



Winter always brings with it long dark nights and cold crisp days - we can't wait to close the door on the weather and get comfortable and warm by the fire. The gardeners amongst us have very little to do but protect our fragile plants from the nip of the frost but I would ask you to spare a thought for the sometimes forgotten visitors to your garden. I am referring of course to the various types of birds that can be found there. You can help the birds and get great pleasure for little effort by providing a feeding station such as a bird table or some other safe location for them to feed. The food you provide should have good nutritional value and try to avoid white bread and kitchen scraps as these can attract vermin. Peanuts, seeds and fat balls can be bought in small quantities at our local Farm Shop and Garden Centres at a very reasonable cost. If possible position the feeding station so it can be seen from your favourite chair and just sit back and count the number of birds that visit within a very short time. Try if you can to identify the various species and if you get hooked you may find a bird guide is helpful - I hope you do. Celebrate The South West Coast Path

The South West Coast Path Association is busy organising a special event to celebrate their 40th anniversary next Spring, with the aim of funding improvement projects throughout the route of the South West Coast Pathin Cornwall, Devon, Dorset and Somerset.

To raise funds for small but significant improvement projects, over and above general maintenance of the path, the SWCPA are launching "The Great South West Walk – putting 40 years of love back into the Coast Path!"

A large number of countryside organisations are supporting the event including the South West Coast Path Team, the National Trust, County Councils and Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty Teams, along with local walking groups & numerous tourism businesses. Media partnerships have also been secured with Western Morning News, Cornwall Today and BBC Radio Solent, Devon and Cornwall.

The event next April/May aims to encourage at least 30 walkers each day across a series of sponsored walks which have been broken down into 56 legs and will be done in relays to cover the entire 630 mile path around Dorset, Devon and Cornwall (as well as the Exmoor coast through Somerset).
