Caribbean chicken and pumpkin curry

Preparation time: overnight. Cooking time: 1 to 2 hours.

Serves: Serves 4.

If you have time to leave the chicken overnight to marinate. it will really benefit from it.

Ingredients

8 bone-in chicken thighs. skinned, or a jointed chicken, Skinned.

For the marinade

- 4 spring onions, roughly chopped
- 4 garlic cloves, roughly chopped
- 20g/3/40z piece root ginger, roughly chopped
- 2 scotch bonnet chillies (or according to taste), seeds removed, finely chopped
- 1 lime, zest and juice
- 2 tbsp medium curry powder blend, preferably Caribbean
- ½ tsp ground allspice
 - salt and freshly ground black pepper

For the curry

- 1 tbsp vegetable or coconut oil
- 1 onion, thickly sliced
- 300ml/10fl oz chicken stock or water
- 2 tomatoes, peeled and diced
- 2 large sprigs thyme
- 2 bay leaves
- 400g/14oz pumpkin, cut into large chunks
- ½ lime, juice only
- 1 tsp rum (optional)

To serve

steamed rice

sliced spring onions

chopped fresh parsley or coriander

Method

- *Put the chicken thighs in a bowl and season with salt and pepper.
- *Put all the marinade ingredients into a small food processor and blend to a paste - add a little water if needed.
- *Pour the marinade over the chicken and mix thoroughly to make sure the chicken is completely covered. Cover and leave for as long as you can - at least a couple of hours, but overnight is better. If you are leaving it out for long-

er than an hour, put the chicken in the fridge.

For the curry, heat the vegetable or coconut oil in a large casserole. Add the onion and cook on a medium heat for several minutes until starting to turn golden brown. Add the chicken and the marinade to the casserole – the idea is not to brown the chicken, but do give the marinade ingredients a couple of minutes to cook before adding the stock or water.

Add the tomatoes, thyme and bay leaves and season with salt and pepper. Bring to the boil, then turn the heat down, cover, and leave to simmer for around 40 minutes.

Add the pumpkin and cook for a further 10 minutes, covered. Pour in the lime juice and the rum, if using. Remove the lid and cook for another 5-10 minutes to reduce the sauce slightly and finish off cooking the pumpkin.

Serve with steamed rice and topped with sliced spring onions and fresh parsley or coriander.



Cornwall Council CEO appointed as Brexit commission member

Cornwall Council CEO Kate Kennally was last week appointed as an expert member on an advisory commission on how to safeguard public services as the UK leaves the European Union. Launched last week by the Chartered Institute of Public Finance & Accountancy, the Brexit Advisory Commission on Public Services plans to examine how risks can be mitigated and opportunities seized to make public services "more flexible, effective and sustainable" following Brexit. Claire Kober (Lab), Haringey LBC leader and chair of London Councils was also appointed to represent local government. The commission has said it will seek to shape government negotiation choices in order to protect and boost the

sustainability of public services. It will focus its activity on three main research themes: the fiscal and fundina landscape, enhancing policy to boost outcomes and capacity to deliver and transform. The commission will share "practical insight" on the risks and opportunities for public services, host a series of public debates and publish a final recommendation document as negotiations come to a close. Ms Kennally said: "It is an honour to be appointed to this role, the referendum highlighted outcome frustration with how public bodies are responding to local priorities

Ola!!

Already reminiscing about our Summer holiday this year which consisted of a month long road trip through France, Spain and Portugal culminating in a family wedding in the Algarve. The trip itself was spectacular as we drove through very diverse scenic



landscapes, especially in Spain and Central Portugal, and was very different to what I had anticipated - vast areas were just parched land. With temperatures above 40 degrees, there was very little greenery except large numbers of olive trees making up the major part of the vegetation. Wildlife in these arid areas was sparse what could be seen were large birds of prey, Eagles and Vultures would both be present in these locations but no identification of species could be made. One sign of wildlife that was unmissable were nests of the White Stork – these large constructions of sticks, branches, grasses and other materials can be over two metres in diameter. The nests are built frequently on manmade structures most spectacularly on the chimneys of houses where, in most cases, the occupants welcome the birds as they are seen as a sign of good luck and fertility, hence the age old theory of the Stork bringing babies in to the world. After breeding these birds would in the past have migrated back to Africa – latest information now says that a large number are over-wintering in Southern Portugal – now classing them as a resident of Europe.

I was able to include two new species of bird to my tick list while away – the first is a migrant to the UK but I have never seen it here – it is the Glossy Ibis. The Ibis is a wading bird, a little larger than the Cattle Egret, with which it very often feeds, a tall bird with long legs, neck and a sickle shaped bill. Breeding adults have reddish brown bodies and shiny bottle green wings and with a distinctive silhouette the birds are mostly seen feeding in shallow water and other marshy areas.

Ola!!

The other bird added to my list is a member of the Magpie family – smaller than our own Magpie, the Azure Winged Magpie is less boldly marked with azure blue wings and tail, (from which the bird gets its name), grey shoulders, belly and rump, black cap and bill. It is a very visible bird within its range but very often heard before being seen, a very harsh loud call giving its position away.

The return part of our trip had us staying in the Poitou-Charentes region in South West France – during a journey back to our accommodation after dark we had a very close encounter with a large Wild Boar – the beast just missing the car by inches. We were fortunate as stories told locally talk of the vehicle very often coming off second best - not surprising as these animals can weigh in excess of fifteen stone.

No matter where our travels take us, if we keep observant there is always something we can learn and new experiences to be had.

History Snippet To Nomanschester via Bucklorium!

Ten years ago the County Archaeologist noted the areas of rectangular fields on the old parish map. They inhabited the ridge from the Barbican to Treveria and stood out from the curving Celtic / Anglo-Saxon hedge-lines. They suggested Roman influence. Romans imposed their estates on the



landscape with mathematical precision. We know the Romans came here. But where? And Why?

After ten years of looking I haven't much more to report! Romans were here for 400 years, so early initiatives could have been forgotten. (We don't have much working knowledge of life in the Parish when Elizabeth I died!) So 'Roman' is a long time.

Things that would have endured would have been Holy sites, routes, safe harbours, landing places, sources of raw materials – things to tax.

When the Romans came, our landscape had already been moulded by Iron Age farmers in their settlements with steams as boundaries. An expeditionary force would have to find an unoccupied space! They would be totally self sufficient and when they went they took their essential belongings with them. Shadowy shapes in banks and ditches, knowledge and words maybe their only legacy. 2000 years ago the tide was out! Calculating erosion rates leaves a fairly accurate notion that the sea was beyond Looe Island – which was a headland. Our valleys and trackways went on to a lost land while we were some way from the shore. There was iron ore in Bodigga Cliff, peat at Millendreath, alder groves for charcoal and smelting furnaces. (Romans taxed iron).

The gaps in the cliffs made good landing places and the river valleys

led inland to more resources. The Parish had fresh water, reeds for thatch, high points for beacons, woodland and rivers for fish. A signal station could have sent a message to the North Coast within an hour. It is quite easy to imagine a route across the ridge down to East Looe river ford. It would have met the North / South way from the coast at the church. Was this once a wayside shrine?

There is one Latin name left in the field names – Melvinia, black grapes, Was this a Roman vineyard? If so it means there was a thriving, affluent community here. And why do we write Treveria and Trelowia when we mean Treverry and Treloy?

I think we have a wealth of clues to our Dark Age past – but we need to find them. After all, someone left the know-how, organisational skills, man-management and commercial enterprise to build a state-of-the-art tide mill on the beach at Millendreath long before written records at the dawn of History.




Art Exhibition and Sale
