#### **Planning Applications**

**PA25/02910. Proposal:** Certificate of Lawfulness for the existing use of the property in breach of the agricultural occupancy condition imposed upon planning consent 00/00889/FUL, continually and without break for a period more than 10 years prior to the date of this application. **Location:** Millpark Farm Cottage, Millendreath, Looe, Cornwall.

**PA25/03028. Proposal:** Re-development of existing beach resort to create new flood alleviation channel, replacement of 103 units of holiday accommodation (existing and extant) and the addition of up to 87 units of holiday accommodation. Construction of a restaurant building, a central facilities building, a tennis court, car parking, passing places, re-alignment of the coastal path, hard and soft landscaping, fixed surface infrastructure and other associated works. **Location:** Millendreath Holiday Village, Millendreath, Looe, Cornwall.

# Looking For John Smith

I've been investigating a family who lived in troubled times when Henry VIII demolished the monastries and cut ties with Europe and Rome All seats of learning had gone. No one was left to write the record. Cornish Catholics tried in vain to keep their lands, titles. - and heads! One such family were the Smiths of Tregunnick.

Tregunnick had belonged to Launceston Priory and Thomas Smith bought his leasehold land.

Tregunnick is between Downderry and Hessenford. The Smiths had been acquiring land by marrying heiresses. They had estates in St. Minver (Rock!), Lavethan, Blisland, Trewint and Lanwarnick in Duloe. They married Mayows, Mayors of Looe. They had the title of Esquire, but no coat of arms.

The family were connected to Sir George Smith, MP, Mayor of Exeter who married a Bevill of Killigarth near Polperro. His family were London goldsmiths who had branched out into banking. They had a coat of arms. They were armigerous!

Society was strict about coats of arms. Messages were conveyed. like imogees. This Smith family had martlets on their shield. A martlet was a mythical bird like a martin or swift. Folklore believed that they had no legs, so martlets have feathers underneath. They symbolised a family without any land to land on. Most upperclass families were given land in1066, so it looks as if the Smiths were intent on upward mobility!

But they fell foul of ruthless Tudor anti-Catholic laws. Robert Smith was a rebel captain in the Cornish Prayerbook Rebellion of 1549 - routed at Fenny Bridges. His son, Robert, with his wife, were chained in the dock in Launceston with the Martyr, Cuthbert Mayne who was hung, drawn and quartered. Cousins were married to cousins to protect estates by inheritance.

Walter Smith bought buildings from Totnes Priory to create a guildhall for the town. He then bought part of St German's Priory in Saltash to create a guildhall there. This meant that the Guilds could monitor the skilled tradesmen needed to boost the economy. (Good thinking!) There is still a Smithfield Road in the town -and the Guildhall..

But back in Tregunnick, John Smith, son of John Smith, uncle of John Smith, was promoting a design for their coat of arms. George Smith had 3 martlets; they had 4!

In 1620 the Herald's Visitation approved John Smith's coat of arms and he had it put on his gravestone in Sheviock. It also features on the coffin slabs of Margery and Ann Smith in Lansallos and Duloe.

Last week I was sent a 1570 map of Westwivelshire (our first postcode). There, bang in the middle, was "John Smith of Lanwarnick"! The map is in Looe Museum - once our local Guildhall. The Smiths must have arrived - but their story has never been told.

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# **Strawberry Tart**

Wow family and friends with a stunning strawberry tart. A lovely centrepiece dessert for summer dining, it's made with homemade pastry and crème pâtissière.

Prep:35 mins
Cook:45 mins
+ chilling
Ingredients
125g unsalted butter, softened slightly
85g icing sugar
1 egg
200g plain flour, plus extra for dusting
100g strawberry jam
500g strawberries, (small hulled, large
sliced)



Easy.

2 tbsp apricot jam 300ml milk 150ml double cream 1 tsp vanilla extract 3 egg yolks 60g caster sugar 3½ tbsp cornflour 50g butter, cubed and softened

1, Beat the butter and sugar together until smooth, but not fluffy. Mix in the egg until combined, then add the flour. Bring together with your hands to form a dough. Wrap and chill in the fridge for 30 mins.

2. Dust a surface with flour and roll out the pastry to a 26cm circle (or 3cm bigger than your tin). Line a 23cm fluted tart tin with the pastry, leaving an overhang. Prick the base with a fork to stop any air bubbles forming. Chill for 30 mins.

3. Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6. Line the pastry case with a scrunched up sheet of baking parchment and baking beans, then bake for 15 mins. Remove the parchment and beans and bake for 15-20 mins more until crisp and golden. Leave in the tin to cool.

4. To make the crème pâtissière, heat the milk, cream and vanilla in a pan over a medium heat, stirring occasionally. Bring up to a simmer. Meanwhile, whisk the yolks and sugar in a bowl for 3 mins until pale,

then stir in the cornflour until combined. Pour a quarter of the hot cream over the egg mix, whisking continuously, then pour the warm egg mix into the pan with the rest of the cream. Stir over a low-medium heat for 5-8 mins until the crème pâtissière thickens. Transfer to a large bowl and cool for 15 mins, whisking occasionally. Gradually whisk in the butter until smooth, cover and put in the fridge until need-ed.

5 Beat the strawberry jam to loosen it, then spread over the bottom of the pastry case. Put the crème pâtissière piping bag into a and pipe in a spiral on top of the jam. Arrange the strawberries on top in a Heat the pattern. apricot jam in а small pan with 1 until tbsp water warm. Whisk to loosen the jam, then leave to cool slightly. Brush over the top of the strawberries.





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# Something To Crow About

In the Winter of 2023 I noticed one of my avian visitors to the garden, a Carrion Crow, had what appeared to be an injured wing. Two or three primary feathers on the right wing were missing. As the bird could still fly quite well I thought that in a few months they would be replaced. In March of that year I realised that the bird had a partner and observing the pair together it turned out that it was a female - the pair returned to the garden on a daily basis to feed on the seeds and other food that had dropped from my feeders. On closer observation. it was clear that they had a nest site in an Elm tree just 150 metres from the house, and as the Elm tree is one of the latest to come in to full leaf the nest itself was very visible. Visits to the garden by the female were less frequent – the male bird still very regular. It was guite clear that the male bird was feeding the female who was now incubating their eggs. While carrying out its paternal duties he became very aggressive towards other birds that were deemed too close to the nest site.



After a few weeks the female started to visit the garden – both birds would fill their pouches with food to carry back to the now hatched chicks. Both the adult birds could be seen searching for food in the nearby fields and as the weeks went by the chicks began flapping around in the nest and on one occasion were heard calling to the parent birds when returning to the nest with food.

On a lovely day in early July we were in for a treat as not only did the parent birds visit the garden, they brought with them three healthy fledglings, still demanding feeding after leaving the nest. These birds were with us all Summer, coming and going, but never far away as Crows are very territorial. By this time it had become obvious that the female was not going to regrow her primary feathers so an injury was probably the cause of the loss.

# Something To Crow About

In the Winter and Summer of 2024 the birds behaviour was the same as the previous year with regards to the nest site location as Crows often return to the same nest site year after year. In June the pair started to visit the garden feeding many times during the day but not taking any food away. Because the pair were such regular visitors I deduced that there were no fledglings this year – the cause was probably predation by an avian predator of some kind.

Now fast forward to the Winter of 2025 - the pair now had started to build a nest in our small copse of trees just 25 metres from the house. The pair were so easily identifiable by the females deformity so I was able to positively say that they were the same birds. We are now in May and both birds can be seen close by, the male doing most of the foraging. During the searches for food I have seen it return to the garden on three occasions with slow worms which it proceeds to eat while sitting on the edge of my bird bath necessitating it to be refreshed two or three times a day. Other food that has been identified while being eaten are frogs and the remains of a small rabbit - all these foods have been eaten after being dunked in the bird bath. Unfortunately they have also collected food from a source and dunked this in the bird bath - items include white and brown mouldy bread and on one occasion a sausage roll!! While this may seem of no consequence, you should never feed wild birds any processed food of any kind as this is detrimental to their health - mould can cause lung disease in birds so any such items should be disposed of in the correct manner as it will most certainly attract vermin to the site of distribution

I have been observing these birds now for several weeks and now that I have to send this piece to be included in the Parish Magazine, I can report that the birds behaviour is as before – they are frantically going to and fro to the nest to feed what I now know to be three large healthy chicks. I do hope the outcome for this Crow family is favourable as you can never be certain – nature can be both cruel and wonderful.

One last observation from the garden at this time – Unfortunately I have seen a rabbit with what I believe to be Myxomatosis – this viral disease is nearly always fatal and the affected animal can take around two weeks to die.

Life and death in nature can be observed at a glance.
