Our Iron-Age forbears had a hillside settlement in a cosy sun-trap with distant views. The site became 'Round Field' with a new farm-stead, Coomb Park. The open hilltop, where three roads met, gradually became developed and now houses Looe Bay Holiday Camp. And thereby hangs a tale!

Before the tide filled the estuary, there was an ancient route down to a river-crossing at **Steps**. It crossed the East-West way to the **port** at **Looe**.



Tregoad has Roman connections and it is very likely that this cross-road had a Sacred Shrine. When Christians settled they built their Saxon church of **St Martin** on sacred soil at the crossroad. Market-stalls, commerce, hospitality and travel led to a Saxon township around our church. It was called **Martinstowe**. There was a barn and dwellings; wells and plough lands and **Longcoe**, the church wood. The whole area was in Royal **Pendrym Manor** from the time of Edward the Confessor to 1920. The Lord of the Manor had the upper

In 1066 the Norman Bodrugans took charge of Pendrym.

They lived in **Mevagissey** so installed their relatives in the church. They collected the tithe tax and began to extend the church lands into a quasi Manor House.

The Saxons were moved out and **Martinstowe** forgotten. Royal assent was granted for fishponds, a dovecote and rabbit warren

The Normans had conquered. By 1400 the tide had blocked the route West. The church estate, **the Glebe**, became a private enclave. (mauve on the Tithe Map)

In C17th the Lady of the Manor built herself a **Manor House** with grounds and entrances. She re-routed the **Churchbridge** lane to keep worshippers away. The new lane cut up through the valley past Coomb Park and round to the church. She planted a chestnut tree at the top. The manor was abandoned before 1800.

In 1820 the Lord of the Manor donated land for a school where three roads met. It was called **Great Tree Schoo**l after the chestnut tree! By 1840 the Turnpike road was forged through to **Barbican Road** and the chestnut blew down. In 1880 the Lord of the Manor dismantled the old Manor House and used the material to renovate his housing stock. Coomb Park became habitable along with properties at Tregoad and Barbican. In 1897 the children planted a beech tree with a memorial for Queen Victoria's jubilee. This is now in **No Man's Land**.

Our hilltop site remains disjointed and haphazard. When **Looe** floods, maybe **Martinstowe** could rise again around our ancient church. This historic landscape still holds hope for a future community. There will be a welcome in the hillside!

It is very easy to make and delicious! My husband absolutely loved it! Thank you, Pam. It will be on my dessert menus from now on.



Pam also mentioned that it is great cold, cut into little squares as cakes. When she wants to do that she cooks it in a square baking tin, instead of an oven to table dish

Pam's Granny's Baked Bread Pudding

recipesfromacornishkitchen.blogspot.com

Take: $\frac{3}{4}$ lb stale white bread, cut into large cubes - no crusts Soak for a few hours, then squeeze out the water. [This is easier in smaller amounts]

Beat until smooth ish.

Then just add all the other ingredients:

6 oz mixed dried fruit

2 oz each of dried chopped dates, glace cherries and dried apricots

4 ½ oz light soft brown sugar

3 oz melted butter

2 medium eggs

Grated lemon rind, mixed spice, cinnamon and nutmeg - all to taste Optional extras - marmalade or golden syrup. I plumped for the syrup and put in a large dash. In fact I added it when I beat the bread. Mix well. That's it. Easy peasey.

Tip into a buttered baking dish and bake for 1 hour at 190 deg C Thanks Pam x

Create a hedgehog friendly garden

It's the end of the hedgehog foraging season. This is when they're at their most active, making it the perfect time to see them wandering through your garden.

Whilst they're getting ready to settle down for their winter hibernation, there are steps you can take to attract them to your property.



Given that the species is in decline, these measures provide the added benefit of giving hedgehogs a crucial lifeline.

In a video shared on TikTok, gardening expert Deb shared some simple tips for attracting them, reports **the Mirror**.

She explained there are easy ways to draw them in.

To encourage their visits, she said you simply need to put one key strategy into place.

Deb said: "Now, it may seem simple, but the first thing to do is make sure you have a hedgehog highway. Hedgehogs can roam up to one mile each night.

"A log pile, compost heap or purpose-built house in a shaded spot will give hedgehogs a safe place to rest and hibernate. Provide food and water, not milk. Contrary to popular belief, milk is bad for hedgehogs. Do not leave milk out. Leave out fresh water."

She added you can also buy hedgehog biscuits to leave around your garden for them.

This will give them some tasty snacks to munch on. She also pointed out that hedgehogs are particularly keen on gardens featuring leafy trees, so it's worth keeping this in mind.

If you don't have these, Deb recommended it might be worthwhile planting some.

Why do hedgehogs like shelter?

Hedgehogs are drawn to gardens because they offer a safe haven alongside food, water and shelter.

These features are vital for them to rest, bring up their young and hibernate in safety. They typically favour quiet, dry and tucked-away spots found in gardens.

Compost heaps, log piles or spaces beneath sheds and thick foliage are amongst their preferred hideaways.

That's why establishing a "wild corner" with a pile of logs, leaves and garden waste is helpful, as it provides ideal nesting material and shelter.

You can also buy or build a specially-designed hedgehog house. If you're lighting the fire more often at the moment, you'll be glad to hear they love log piles.

These provide both food and shelter.

Log piles create a home for insects such as beetles and woodlice, which are key food sources for hedgehogs.

They also offer a safe refuge for hedgehogs to hibernate, breed and rest as the piles provide protection from predators.

Adding some straightforward features to your garden can encourage them to pay a visit.




Just Another Day

Gardens, and the countryside, can be inspirational at any time of the year, especially when something out of the ordinary happens - right now we have just that. We are at the end of what is called a 'Mast Year'. Mast years occur every three to five years according to the seasons weather – normally a dry Spring and a wet start to the Summer is a formula for such an event. The indicators are an abundance of fruit, nuts, berries and seeds which are collectively called 'Mast'. My own observations are the vast amounts of chestnuts and hazel nuts we have had on trees and bushes in the garden – this harvest has been attracting birds such as Jays and Pheasants who are mainly feasting on wind fall apples. Thankfully there will still be plenty left for an apple crumble/pie or two on chilly days.

However, the most activity has been from the squirrels collecting and stashing chestnuts in all parts of the garden. This behaviour ensures in the wild that new trees, bushes and shrubs grow and provide food for animals and birds alike. We did manage to gather some for ourselves to roast at Christmas.

Other observations in the garden have been the sighting on four separate days of Humming Bird Hawk Moths feeding on the various pot plants we have on the patio. I would like to think that the sightings

were of different individuals but due to their rarity it is more likely to be the same one. On another occasion, while just pottering in the garden, I heard a bird call that I had not heard before and although I didn't actually see the source of the call I was able to identify the bird by using an App I have on my phone – it was almost certainly a Stock Dove – not uncommon apparently but certainly new to me.

A bird we have seen in the garden numerous times is the Sparrow Hawk – a very sleek and beautifully marked bird when seen perched, but a lethal killer as witnessed by me when watching birds on the bird table. From out of nowhere a male bird snatched a Dunnock, more commonly known as a Hedge Sparrow, and pinned it to the ground where it stayed for several minutes before flying off with its prey.



As hard as it is to see – that is nature.
